Recommendations:

- Print on white cardstock and number the cards on the back (this makes for easier collection at the end – but remember, don't hand the cards out in order.)
- There are two size options – full page or quarter page.
- To save ink, the cards may be printed in black and white.
- When printing, select "Scale To Print>Fill Entire Paper".
- Laminate the cards to prolong the lifespan of the activity.
- There are 16 cards. If you have less than 16 students, consider challenging students who are demonstrating mastery by giving them 2 cards.
- If you have more than 16 students, consider pairing a struggling student and a student who is demonstrating mastery to work as a team.
- Remember: this activity is reserved for Step 8 of Conversational Solfege because it uses both familiar and unfamiliar patterns.

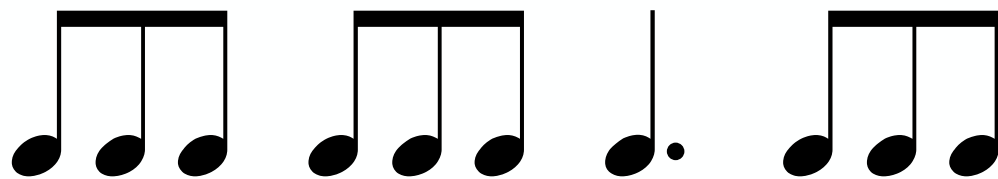
Directions:

- ♪ Pass out a card to each student.
- ♪ Put on a metronome or piece of classical music that is in 6/8 on a loop in the background to help maintain the steady beat.
- ♪ Pick a student to read his or her card aloud: "I Have _____, Who Has _____?"
- ♪ The student who has the matching rhythm goes next.
- ♪ If no one responds, have the last person read the card again and have the students help their neighbors find the matching rhythm.
- ♪ The game continues until you reach the first person who read a card or until everyone has had a turn.

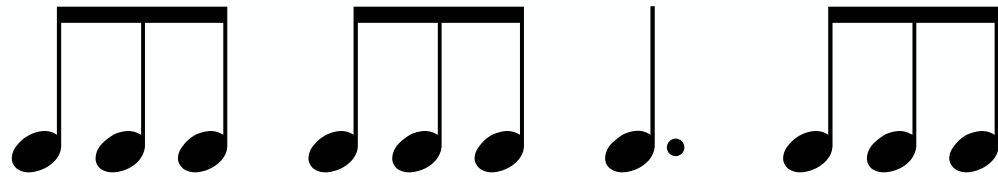
